We are preparing ourselves for the Synod with a series of meetings in Advent, which will take place in the Upper Room at 7.30 pm on 30 November, 7 December, 14 December and 21 December. These meetings will be chaired by Kate Williamson and will use material prepared by the diocese. There will be additional meetings in the Hall on Wednesdays 1 December, 8 December, 15 December and 22 December after Mass, at 10.30am, for those who prefer a daytime appointment. From an interview with Cardinal Grech on the upcoming Synod.

The synodal process has come in for criticism over the years. What do you say to each of these concerns? a) Its decentralizing effect is causing doctrinal confusion and “doctrinal anarchy” within the Church b) Synods are vehicles for heterodoxy, a means of introducing liberal teachings and secular values into the Church, mainly because many of those being consulted are poorly catechized c) Synodality is merely a process of Protestantization of the Church — it has been tried in Protestant communities and led to division and disunity. Pope Francis intends that the Synod no longer be merely an event, but rather a process in which each baptized can be heard. If the bishops do not listen to those who are poorly catechized, we will never know how to heal the poorly catechized through our magisterium. As a result, when properly understood and engaged, the synodal process is meant to heal doctrinal confusion and anarchy, by recognizing the specific grace given to each believer and placing this grace in dialogue with the bishops. By will of Christ, this listening process must be led by the Church’s pastors to whom has been entrusted a specific charism of discernment, and above all by the Successor of Peter, who is the principle of unity in the Church. Listening to the People of God, therefore, does not mean adjusting to heterodox opinions, but recognizing the voice of the Holy Spirit within the whole of the baptized. In this way, synodality is not the Protestantization of the Catholic Church. Each Christian confession has its own way of understanding and living synodality. The Catholic way to synodality is rooted on communion, which is Christ’s gift to the Church; communion lived within the relational dynamic that exists between the People of God, the bishops in their charism of discernment, and the Holy Father’s exercise of his Petrine Primacy.

Right now we are doing a virtual Walking Tour Through the Bible, starting with the Book of Genesis, in bite size chunks. We are currently on the First Book of Samuel. This Sunday is the Thirty-Third (and penultimate) Sunday of the Year. The prayers and readings can be found in the blue Mass books on page 157. The first reading comes from the prophecy of Daniel, and is the vision of the Last Judgement, when the dead will rise, some to go to an eternal reward and some to eternal punishment, a scene which is illustrated by Michelangelo in the Sistine Chapel. The Gospel, from Saint Mark, is also about the End, when Christ shall judge the world. We are coming to the end of the Church’s year, and so our attention should be on the Four Last Things: death,

judgement, heaven and hell. This should not frighten us, but at the same time, it requires our careful attention.

This Sunday is Remembrance Sunday being the Sunday closest to Armistice Day. The 11.15am Mass will be a Requiem for all the Dead of War. There will be no Gloria, but the Creed will be sung.

Many people no longer carry money – hence our machine for electronic donations at the back – but if you do, Josie will be collecting loose change and notes after all Sunday Masses in November in aid of the Hall. She will have her bucket, so please do be generous!

Once more this Sunday at 4pm we are holding a Holy Hour, ending in good time before the Lusophone Mass which is at 5pm. This hour has the advantage of being at the evocative time of sunset. The idea of the Holy Hour (much loved by the Blessed Carlo Acutis, who made one as often as he could) is to spend time with the Lord in the Blessed Sacrament, usually having silent prayer, hymns, the Evening Prayer of the Church (Vespers) and Benediction. This is a very good way of praying for the dead, and also remembering the bereaved and showing our solidarity with them.

We are aware that there is something wrong with the sound system. Steps are being taken to remedy this.

As you may have heard last week, we have a visitor in the parish, Father Stipica Lesic, who is a priest of the Archdiocese of Sarajevo in Bosnia-Herzegovina, a city that has often played a role in European history. We are very pleased to welcome him, and as he is here to perfect his

English before going to the missions in Uganda, please do your best to help him practice his English.

This Sunday at 7pm our Confirmation candidates will be meeting in Church for the rehearsal. Let us pray for them. Parents and sponsors need to attend as well. Confirmation is on Saturday 20 November. The rehearsal will not last more than an hour at the very most.


