Narrative II.

22 February, which is a Friday, is the feast of the Chair (or See) of Saint Peter. This year the feast does not fall within Lent, and given that we are under the patronage of Saint Peter, we are going to hold the parish quiz on that day in the Hall. This will start at 7.30pm. Tickets will soon be on sale, and all proceeds are going to the Chestnut Tree Hospice, which is one of our parish charities.

Brace yourselves! Lent is coming. Easter is late this year, and Ash Wednesday falls on 6th March. Not many people know this but..... The earliest date Ash Wednesday can occur is 4 February (which is only possible during a common year with Easter

on 22 March), which happened in 1598, 1693, 1761 and 1818 and will next occur in 2285. The latest date Ash Wednesday can occur is 10 March (when Easter Day falls on 25 April) which occurred in 1666, 1734. 1886 and 1943 and will next occur in 2038. Ash Wednesday has never occurred on Leap Year Day (29 February), and it will not occur as such until 2096. The only other vears of the third millennium that will have Ash Wednesday on 29 February are 2468, 2688, 2840 and 2992. (Ash Wednesday falls on 29 February only if Easter is on 15 April in a leap year starting on a Sunday.) [From Wikipedia]. Anyway, even though we have some time to go, we need to start thinking about Lent before it catches up with us. We have two things planned so far:

1. On Friday evenings there will be Stations of the Cross at 7.30pm in Church. This is the traditional time, but another time is possible. We can also have Stations at some point during daylight hours, if desired. Note: on Friday 5 April we have our Taizé service.

2. In keeping with our Bishop's encouragement, and following on from what we did in Advent,we shall have 'Scripture Thursdays' in the Upper Room at 8pm. This will mean a consideration of the Passion Narrative of Saint Luke, as is fitting for the Year of Luke (year C) and for Lent.

This Sunday is the Fourth Sunday in the Year. The first reading describes the call of the prophet Jeremiah, who is

entrusted with the Word of God from the first moments of his existence, and exhorted to proclaim that Word to the people of Israel with courage and persistence. He will meet opposition, but God will always be with him to help him. In the Gospel, which continues the story from last week. Jesus. like Jeremiah before him, is contested by the people of Nazareth who even try to throw Him off a cliff. Both readings underline the fact that the Christian message is clearly countercultural. We are not here to tell the world that it is right about everything, but to proclaim a message that may be out of keeping with worldly wisdom. Meanwhile, in the second reading, Saint Paul expounds the nature of Christian love: all the qualities he mentions are ones we aspire to, but perhaps only meet from time to time. This list (patience, gentleness, and so on) is a good one for us to contemplate when we are preparing ourselves for confession.

This Sunday there is no sermon, but a pastoral letter from Bishop Richard.

This Sunday, 3 February, is Saint Blaise's Day. We are not celebrating the feast liturgically, but we will be holding the blessing of the throats after each Mass. In this traditional ceremony the priest holds two unlit candles against the throat of the person being blessed and says: "Through the intercession of Saint Blaise, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from every disease of the throat and from every other illness: In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." Saint Blaise was the bishop of Sebaste in Armenia during the fourth century. Very little is known about his life. According to various accounts he was a doctor before becoming a bishop. Devotion to him spread throughout the entire Church in the Middle Ages because he was reputed to have

miraculously cured a little boy who nearly died because of a fishbone in his throat. From the eighth century he has been invoked on behalf of the sick, especially those afflicted with illnesses of the throat. At the end of each Mass this Sunday, you are invited to line up along the sanctuary steps to receive the blessing, should you wish to do so.

This Sunday, at 3pm, our brethren of the Syriac Orthodox Church are celebrating their Divine Liturgy at 3pm.

Next Sunday is the Sunday nearest to the feast of Our Lady of Lourdes, and on that day we are having a retiring collection for the Lourdes Fund, which enables those who cannot afford it to join the diocesan pilgrimage to Lourdes. Please give generously. Mass organisers, please take this notice as your advice in this matter. Last year the diocese was able to disburse £60,275 of financial support to those who otherwise might not have been able to go, thanks to the 70 parishes who collected for this purpose. His Lordship the Bishop particularly commends this collection to us. (There are envelopes for your donations too; Mass organisers, please note.)

Liturgical notes:

February is the month dedicated to the Holy Family. On days on which there is no feast we will celebrate either a votive Mass of Our Lady or a votive Mass of Saint Joseph.

Tuesday is the feast of Saint Agatha, virgin and martyr.

Wednesday is the feast of Saint Paul Miki and companions, martyrs of Japan. Friday is the feast of Saint Josephine Bakhita.

Good news. Our Paschal candlestick has come back from repair, and is now

looking magnificent; and so has our processional Cross. The Paschal candlestick will make its appearance at Easter, all baptisms and all funerals. The processional cross will be used at all Sunday Masses. In addition, we have received delivery of four new chalices; these come from Italy (naturally) and cost 140 euro each, which, despite the exchange rate, is very competitive. (For purposes of comparison, to repair one of our old chalices and to make it fit for use would have cost £300.) These chalices and the renewed brasswork are in memory of Audrev Ockenden, who kindly left the church £15,000 in her will. None of the new or renewed items require polishing; they are to be cleaned with soapy water and dried with a soft cloth only. Sacristans and other interested parties, please take this notice as your advice on this matter.

Note (from last week, slightly modified): do please us the Sunday Mass Books provided for you, in which you can follow all the readings and the prayers of the Mass. The priest always announces what Sunday it is, so you can find it in the book; in addition, the Sunday of the year is mentioned in this newsletter. The text of the Creed is found on page 11, which is useful, and all the other prayers that are used every Sunday are there. These books are guite easy to use, and they must have cost a fortune when the parish bought them, so it would be nice to get some use out of them. They are designed to help us appreciate the readings the more: so too is the opening section of this newsletter, which always summarises the readings, because, as we all know, the human mind needs help in retaining information. On the same subject, the readings of the day are available online and via a series of

apps for your phone. You can also use the traditional method of having a Sunday and/or weekday Missal.

Please pray for the soul of Margaret Dingwall, who died on 11 January. Margaret lived in Brooker Street, and had been a member of the parish for the last twenty years or so. Margaret's Requiem Mass took place on Saturday 26 January at 10am, organised too late for inclusion in last week's newsletter. (The intention for Eileen Fogarty RIP for that day has been transferred to 9 February.) Margaret's sister and nieces live in America, and her executor lives in Hong Kong, and they have already returned to their respective homes. Margaret donated her body to science so her Requiem was not coram cadavere (that means there was no coffin present). However, all the funeral prayers and the Final Commendation took place as usual. It was nice to see so many parishioners present, and many of our visitors commented favourably on the funeral. Meanwhile, let us continue to pray for her soul and for the comfort of her family and friends.

It is with sadness that we have learned of the death of Margaret Forrest, who lived at Aspen House, on Wilbury Avenue, who died on Friday 25 January after a short illness. She had been a faithful parishioner here for many years, and a leading member of the Union of Catholic Mothers, and was regularly visited by Jean Murray, and had also been visited by Fr Alexander. Let us pray for the repose of her soul. The funeral will take place here on Thursday 14 February at 11am.

Sacristy prayers: We have now got copies of the Sacristy prayers composed by the late Monsignor Pat Ollivier for the parish in Guildford. Ten minutes before Mass begins all minsters are requested to assemble in the sacristy for these prayers of preparation. This is a way of emphasising the importance of all service on the altar, and has the practical benefit of making sure everyone is present.

This Friday at 6pm we have our servers' practice and fish and chips. Parents are invited to drop children off at the Church at 6pm and pick them up at 8pm from the Hall. If you leave your children, please leave contact details. If you wish to stay with the children, you are most welcome; indeed, some adult supervision would be greatly appreciated. Last time we all had fun, and we hope to do so again!

This Saturday at 10am, Welcomers are invited to Mass, and to the Hall afterwards for some consideration of the ministry of welcoming. All churches like to think of themselves as welcoming communities, but just how we can be so, or be more so, needs thought. If you are interested in making our parish more welcoming to people, do come along; you do not have to commit to being on the 'front of house' on Sundays. As with the Readers' 'day' we shall have tea/coffee and cake, followed by a theory session or the theology of welcome, and then a practical session on what we need to do to implement the theory. This will end at 1pm. If you missed the Readers' day, do please ask around about what happened so perhaps what we learned then can be shared by a process of osmosis.

Our next baptism class is scheduled for Monday 8 April at 8pm in the Parish Hall. If you have a child to be baptised, then you need to speak to Father Alexander first and arrange a meeting with him before that date.
