This Sunday is the Third Sunday in the Year. The first reading tells us the story of how the priest Ezra reads the Book of the Law (we assume the Book of Deuteronomy) to the assembled people of Israel, out loud, translating as he goes along from Hebrew into Aramaic, a process that takes six hours. All the people listen attentively, standing up (including children) and at the end prostrate themselves as sign of their obedience to the word of the Lord. This story illustrates how the children of

Israel were (and still are) People of the Book. In the Gospel, which is the opening of Saint Luke (Year C is the year of Luke), the author explains why he is writing the gospel, essentially to teach people about the foundation of their faith in Christ. Then we have the story of Jesus entering the synagogue and reading from Isaiah, and telling people that the words they have just heard are fulfilled by his very presence. We too are people of the Book and we value the Bible because it brings us close to Jesus the Saviour. Like the Children of Israel, we need to reverence and love the word of God in the Bible, for it is essential to our salvation.

Note: do please use the Sunday Mass Books provided for you, in which you can follow all the readings and the prayers of the Mass. These books are quite easy to use, and they must have cost a fortune when the parish bought them, so it would be nice to get some use out of them. They are designed to help us appreciate the readings the more; so too is the opening section of this newsletter, which always summarises the readings, because, as we all know, the human mind needs help in retaining information. On the same subject, the readings of the day are available online and via a series of apps for your phone. You can also use the traditional method of having a Sunday and/or weekday Missal.

Next Sunday will be the Fourth Sunday of the Year. This Sunday will fall on the 3 February, which is Saint Blaise's Day. We will not celebrate the feast liturgically, but we will be holding the blessing of the throats after each Mass. In this traditional ceremony the priest holds two unlit candles against the throat of the person being blessed and says: "Through the intercession of Saint Blaise, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from every

disease of the throat and from every other illness: In the name of the Father. and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." Saint Blaise was the bishop of Sebaste in Armenia during the fourth century. Very little is known about his life. According to various accounts he was a doctor before becoming a bishop. Devotion to him spread throughout the entire Church in the Middle Ages because he was reputed to have miraculously cured a little boy who nearly died because of a fishbone in his throat. From the eighth century he has been invoked on behalf of the sick, especially those afflicted with illnesses of the throat.

On the weekend of 2/3 February, instead of a sermon, wee shall be hearing a pastoral letter from Bishop Richard.

Audrey Ockenden, who was a faithful parishioner here for many years, has remembered the parish in her will, and given us a legacy of £15,000. This is very kind of her, and the money will be of great use. It seems appropriate that it be spent in ways that visibly benefit the entire parish. Our Paschal candlestick is being repaired and so is our processional cross, and Audrey's legacy can be used to pay for these two projects, in her memory as well as for the stained glass fund. Needless to say we should be grateful for this very kind gift. The best way for us to do this is to pray for her soul, and to pray for her surviving family. If everyone in the parish were to offer the Rosary for this intention, that would be excellent.

Liturgical notes:

January is the month dedicated to the Holy Name of Jesus. February is the month dedicated to the Holy Family. Monday is the feast of Saint Thomas Aquinas, who is the patron saint of theologians.

Thursday is the feast of Saint John Bosco.

Friday 1 February is the First Friday of

the month, on which day we will celebrate the Votive Mass of the Sacred Heart. According to the private revelations made to St Margaret Mary, the first Friday of every month is a special day on which we should make reparation for our sins and all the offences that the heart of Jesus has suffered thanks to indifference and neglect. In particular, the Saint was promised that if we attend Mass for nine first Fridays in a row, this will ensure us the grace of final repentance. Saturday is the feast of the Presentation of the Lord in the Temple, otherwise known as Candlemas. This feast celebrates the event that took place on the fortieth day after the Lord's birth. when Mary and Joseph took Jesus to be presented to the Lord in the Temple. In the Gospel, we hear Simeon describe Jesus as the light to enlighten all nations. On this day candles are blessed, and Mass starts with a procession.

Sacristy prayers: We have now got copies of the Sacristy prayers composed by the late Monsignor Pat Ollivier for the parish in Guildford. Ten minutes before Mass begins all minsters are requested to assemble in the sacristy for these prayers of preparation. This is a way of emphasising the importance of all service on the altar, and has the practical benefit of making sure everyone is present.

We have a new source of Altar Wine. It comes from the Church suppliers, Hayes and Finch. It is more expensive than our previous altar wine, but this seems to be a reasonable expenditure, given that it is far more palatable (or so

it is hoped) than the previous wine we were using. The law of the Church lays down that the wine used in Mass, which is consecrated and transformed in to the Precious Blood of Our Saviour, should be wine made from grapes and not adulterated.

Correction: Last week, in discussing the Bishop's leaflet it was erroneously said that the diocese is asking for a pound extra per family. Actually, this should have read 'a pound extra per family member' which is rather different.

14 February is Valentine's day and the week surrounding the day is usually designated a time for celebrating marriage. Accordingly, on Sunday 17 February, this is exactly what we shall do. Married couples are invited to come up at the end of Mass (accompanied by their children, if possible) to receive the Nuptial Blessing. This is the prayer that was said over you on your wedding day, though you may well have forgotten its exact contents by now, and it may be useful and pleasant to hear it again in less stressful circumstances. In addition, we have some special matrimonial candles to give away as souvenirs, and signs of your matrimonial commitment. So please note the day, speak to your spouse, and come to be blessed on that day.

22 February, which is a Friday, is the feast of the Chair (or See) of Saint Peter. This year the feast does not fall within Lent, and given that we are under the patronage of Saint Peter, we are going to hold the parish quiz on that day in the Hall. Please note the date now and look out for further details.
