RIP

This Sunday is the Eighth Sunday of the Year. The first reading today, from the Book of Ecclesiasticus, gives us some wise proverbs, dealing with the way our words reveal our characters. In the Gospel we have some similar savings from the Lord Himself, who is

all Wisdom, who tells us that a man's words flow from what fills his heart. Both readings invite us to reflect on the way we speak, and the things that are inside our hearts, and how we can make progress in the spiritual life and become better characters. The psalm talks of the just person flourishing like a palm tree and growing like a Lebanon cedar: as we prepare for Lent we should ask ourselves how we can grow in the Lord.

This Sunday we are hearing an appeal after Holy Communion on behalf of SURVIVE-MIVA, a Catholic lay Association that exists to provide one vital element for the success of the Church's health and pastoral work in areas of great need - a means of transport. It has been some years since this excellent group made an appeal here, so please be generous to them when the retiring collection comes. There will be a sermon, but it will be very short – blink and you will miss it.

Liturgical notes:

Brace yourselves! Lent starts this week on Ash Wednesday, and lasts for forty days and forty nights. During this period we recall the way the Chosen People spent forty years in the desert, on their way to the Promised Land, being tested by the Lord; and we also recall our Lord's forty days in the desert before he began his public ministry, during which he fasted and prayed and was tempted by Satan; and we use this period as way of preparing ourselves for Holy Week and Easter when we remember the events that led to our salvation. Because Lent is a penitential time the organ is only used to support the singing, there are no flowers on the altar, and the Gloria is omitted at Mass, except for important feasts. The vestments are purple.

On Ash Wednesday there is a service with Ashes in the school at 9.15am. Mass is at the usual time in Church but may start a few minutes late. There will be an evening Mass at 7pm both at Sacred Heart and at Saint Mary Magdalene's for workers, but there will be no evening Mass here. The Ashes are a visible sign of our desire to repent from our sins and to start our lives in the Lord anew.

'Scripture Thursdays': This Thursday, in the Upper Room starting at 8pm, and ending by 9.30pm at the very latest, we shall be looking at the Passion Narrative of Saint Luke. Please bring a Bible, all welcome.

This Friday there will be Stations of the Cross at 7.30pm in Church. We will be using the standard Stations composed by Saint Alphonsus, with which you are all familiar. We shall also be singing suitable hymns.

Confessions during Lent. Lent is a time to go to confession! There will be confessions every Friday at 7pm before Stations. There will also be confessions on Saturdays at 10.30am until 11.15am (please note the extended time). And we shall have all day Confessions with Adoration on Saturday 30 March from 10.30am to 5.30am, with lots of visiting priests, including Fr Edward Burton, back by popular demand. It is said that the more a parish offers confession the more people will come.... Let us try and prove that right!

Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament Exposed takes place here every Friday after the 10am Mass for 30 minutes.;The Church and the world have a great need of eucharistic adoration.&; (Pope John Paul II, Dominicae Cenae). What are you giving up for Lent? What are you taking up for Lent?

We have received the sad news of the death of Michael John While, of Charles Close, Hove, who died in hospital on 15th February at the age of 92. May he rest in peace. We have been informed that his funeral Mass will take place here and the date will be announced in due course. In the meantime, let us pray for the repose of his soul.

The recent Quiz Night made the princely sum of £289.95 for the Chestnut Tree Children's Hospice. We will send a cheque to the hospice in due course. Well done to all, young and old, who helped make the evening a great success. We have other social events planned to which all are welcome. Don't forget our film night, The Song of Bernadette, the famous retelling of the events at Lourdes which won numerous Oscars back in the day. The film will be accompanied by wine and pizza, and all are invited. It will take place after the 6pm Mass on Saturday 16 March. Please save the date!

The picture of Saint Charbel has arrived which will be hung, when it is framed, in the former baptistery. St. Charbel Makhlouf was a Maronite Catholic priest, monk, and hermit who is known for working miracles both during his life and after his death. On the occasion of his beatification in 1965, Pope Saint Paul VI described him as "a new, eminent example of monastic sanctity," who "through his intercession is enriching the entire Christian people." Born into humble circumstances in Lebanon in 1828, Yussef Antoun Makhlouf was the youngest of five children. His father died when he was only three. He studied at the parish school and tended to his family's cow.

Engaged in prayer and solitude from an early age, he spent a great deal of time outdoors in the fields and pastures near his village, contemplating God amid the inspiring views of Lebanon's valleys and mountains. His uncle and guardian wanted the boy to continue working with him, while his mother wanted him to marry a young woman. Yussef had other plans, however, and left home in 1851 without informing anyone. He became Brother Charbel, after making a pilgrimage on foot to his new monastic home. In this, he followed the example of his maternal uncles, who were already living as solitary monks at the Hermitage of Saint Paul in the Qadisha Valley. He subsequently studied for the priesthood and was ordained, returning to the Monastery of St. Maron. The priest-monk lived and served in the monastery for 19 years, showing great devotion to the life of prayer, manual work, and contemplative silence. Charbel's superiors observed God's "supernatural power" at work in his life, and he became known as a wonderworker even among some Muslims. In 1875, he was granted permission to live as a solitary monk in a nearby hermitage dedicated to Saints Peter and Paul. Rigorous asceticism, and a profound union with God, continued to characterize his life for the next 23 years. Deeply devoted to God's Eucharistic presence, he suffered a stroke while celebrating the Divine Liturgy of the Maronite Catholic Church on December 16, 1898. He died on Christmas Eve of that year. St. Charbel's tomb has been a site of pilgrimage since his death. Hundreds of miracles are believed to have occurred through his intercession with God, both in Lebanon and around the world. He was canonized in 1977 by Pope Paul VI, who had earlier hailed the Lebanese Maronite saint as an "admirable flower

of sanctity blooming on the stem of the ancient monastic traditions of the East." And soon he will have a shrine in Hove!

The Knights of St Columba are celebrating their centenary this year. The first centenary Mass of the year is being celebrated at St Thomas More in Patcham at 4.00pm Sunday 3rd March by Mgr John Hull. There will be the installation of provisional officers during the Mass. Members of Brighton Deanery are welcome to attend.

The Catholic Children's Society have written to thank us for a donation to the Arundel and Brighton Crisis Fund of £163.57. This fund exists to help families and children in crisis, as its name suggests, by making one off payments to those in need at the suggestions of Headteachers and Parish Priests.
